I. Call to Order

Mr. Les Smith, Executive Board Chair, called the meeting to order at 1:03 PM.

II. Roll Call

Ms. Renee A. Robles conducted roll call, confirming the presence of Chair Les Smith Mr. Javier Moreno, Ms. Leticia Plancarte, Ms. Cierra Gibbs, Mr. Kirk Mann, Ms. Sabrina Barber, Ms. Ramona Campos, Mr. Richard F. Lopez and herself. A quorum was confirmed, allowing the meeting to proceed. Staff and community stakeholders also attended.

III. Approval of Agenda

Mr. Les Smith requested a motion to approve the agenda. Mr. Javier Moreno moved to approve the agenda, and Ms. Leticia Plancarte seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously, 8-0.

IV. Approval of Minutes

Mr. Les Smith sought a motion to approve the minutes from December 3, 2025. Mr. Javier Moreno moved that the minutes be accepted as presented, and Ms. Leticia Plancarte seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously, 8-0.

V. Public Comment

Department of Social Services Deputy Director Ms. Renee A. Robles stated that no public comment was received.

VI. Special Presentations

1. Imperial Valley College (IVC) – Programs and Services (Attachment 2)

Ms. Elizabeth Sanchez, Interim Director of Basic Needs Students and Housing at Imperial Valley College, delivered a PowerPoint presentation on Resilient Scholars Program. Resilient Scholars Program serves foster youth and homeless students ages 16-24 and partners with IVROP, Right Track, and others to identify high-need students and provide services. Some workshops are held at IVC to familiarize students with available programs and support their post high school decision making.

The Restorative Justice Program/NextUp has transitioned from Equity Achievement to Student Services and recently reconnected with the campus. The next step is to collaborate on expanded services for foster youth. Recognizing that students transitioning from incarceration may

experience homelessness, the program provides emergency assistance—such as motel vouchers, emergency funding, and access to a food cart—through IVC referrals.

The Extended Opportunity Programs and Services (EOPS) offer comprehensive support to eligible students, including priority registration, book grants, transportation assistance, individualized counseling, tutoring, community referrals, and more. They work closely with Guardian Scholars to support smooth student transitions. Ms. Sabrina Barber inquired about the eligibility criteria for services. Ms. Sanchez responded that students must be low income and enrolled in at least 12 units to qualify. Counselors host workshops each semester to inform students of available programs based on the universities to which they are applying.

Lotus Living Student Housing Program- Imperial Valley College Student housing program offers affordable housing to eligible IVC students facing homelessness and housing insecurities. The program has 25 housing units with a waiting list, prioritizing students experiencing homelessness. Specialists assist with affordable housing, community referrals, and grant support for deposits and essentials needs. Richard Lopez inquired regarding the maximum duration of residence. Ms. Sanchez stated that students may reside at the Lotus Living Housing for a period of up to two years.

The SDSU/IV Housing Program, in collaboration with IV Campus, currently offers 40 beds for IVC students, with plans to add 40 additional beds. Priority is assigned to students experiencing homelessness, foster youth, and low-income students. If the units are not completed by May 1, applications will be opened to the general student population. The Lotus initiative specifically supports students experiencing homelessness. The SDSU program utilizes a dormitory-style model with shared rooms. IVC and SDSU each have 40 beds, and the units are kept separate. The programs will collaborate on student life activities, share resources, and provide SDSU students with kitchen access. During the meeting, Ms. Barber inquired about the inclusion of a meal plan with traditional dormitory arrangements. Ms. Sanchez clarified that no meal plan is provided because there are no dining facilities, although kitchens are available. The program partners with food banks to distribute weekly food bags and encourages students to obtain food bank cards for monthly distributions. Shared refrigerators are also provided. In response to Ms. Leticia Plancarte's inquiry regarding room amenities, Ms. Sanchez stated that each room contains two beds, an individual desk, and a closet, with shared restrooms and showers.

Basic Needs Center-Include food assistance, a lending library, technology support, and transportation assistance. All services are provided through HHIP.

Emergency Assistance- Covers past due deposits and first month rent. Support may also include overdue bills, vehicle repairs, and medical expenses. The processing time for disbursement is approximately two to three weeks.

IVC Kitchen- Two kitchen locations are available in Building 600 and the trailer area at Building 4600. Grab and go meals are offered once daily, with participants selecting up to three items.

Hygiene Program items are available monthly, and dinner items are selected based on available cooking they have at home. Two food assistance options are available. Option 1 is the Dinner Program for students with access to stove and cooking area. Option 2 is Ready to Eat option for students experiencing homelessness, providing items that require no cooking or only minimum heating. Distribution occurs every two weeks.

Financial Aid: Ms. Alma Orozco, Financial Aid Specialist and Foster Youth Liaison, can provide targeted support to homeless students and those facing housing instability. She can assist students with financial aid applications and petitions to restore eligibility when their aid is affected by unstable housing situations. The program also offers scholarships for the fall 2026 semester, with applications accepted from March through May. In addition, regular workshops are held to guide students through the application process and to inform them about additional funding opportunities, ensuring students have access to the resources they need.

Career Services Center: This program equips students with resources to develop strong resumes, cover letters, and interview skills. Additionally, the Desert Warriors Professional Clothing Closet offers professional attire for students to wear during interviews.

Undocumented Student Resources: This program offers comprehensive support to undocumented students, including assistance with rent and security deposits for several months, depending on individual needs. Additionally, funding is available for those who do not qualify for traditional financial aid. Free legal services are provided through an attorney, and a wide range of guidance and support resources can be found on the program's website.

Disability Support Programs and Services (DSPS): DSPS conducts outreach at local high schools to help seniors transition smoothly into college life. The program provides information about academic accommodations, unit reduction waivers, and guidance for enrolling in support programs such as EOPS and the Promise Program. The Promise Program offers free tuition, a Summer Bridge program, application and service orientation, help with enrollment and financial aid applications, petition support for dropped courses, assigned counseling, priority registration, and limited assistance with books and tuition for students who do not qualify for other aid programs.

VII. Discussion/Action Items

1. Homeless Housing, Assistance and Prevention Program (HHAP) Round 2 (Attachment 3)

Mr. Eduardo Garcia delivered an in-depth presentation on Round 2 of the Homeless Housing

Assistance Prevention Program (HHAP), providing background, budget details, and community impact. Established in 2020 under Assembly Bill 83, HHAP Round 2 is designed to fund solutions addressing homelessness throughout the county.

Garcia explained that the Board of Supervisors approved a standard agreement to allocate \$136,900.48 from the County's HHAP Round 2 funding and \$134,920.18 from the Continuum of Care (CoC) HHAP Round 2 funds, directing these resources to the Catholic Charities Diocese of San Diego. These contracts support a wide range of services, including homelessness prevention, housing assistance, and supportive programs for vulnerable populations.

Garcia also highlighted an emerging trend: Catholic Charities has experienced a marked increase in requests for homelessness prevention assistance, reflecting a significant shift in community needs. This uptick underscores the growing importance of prevention strategies in addition to traditional housing services, and illustrates how HHAP funds are being adapted to meet evolving local challenges.

It was explained that the HHAP Round 2 program funding requires subrecipients to use funds for evidence-based solutions that address and prevent homelessness among eligible populations. These solutions include Rapid Rehousing, Operating Subsidies, Street Outreach, and Services Coordination. Staff reviewed contracts with Catholic Charities, the County, and the CoC, examining the original awarded amounts, subsequent changes, and proposed revisions.

During the meeting, Ms. Ramona Campos asked if street outreach funding had been excluded. Mr. Garcia clarified that the original contracts did include Street Outreach funding—approximately \$66,000 for the County and \$12,000 for the CoC. Ms. Barber then inquired whether these funds were now being redirected to Homeless Prevention. Mr. Garcia confirmed that the funding is indeed being shifted from Street Outreach to Homeless Prevention. Antoinette Fallon added that street outreach services will continue to be provided through alternative funding sources.

Ms. Vega explained that Rapid Rehousing is available only to individuals who are literally homeless. However, limited housing stock has led to an increase in requests for homelessness prevention services among households that are at risk but currently stable. Catholic Charities has access to both Rapid Rehousing and other HHAP Round 3 funds, which are available for prevention, service coordination, and street outreach.

a. Board Action Item

- i. Mr. Les Smith called for a motion to ratify the budget revision to increase homelessness prevention funding in the Catholic Charities, Diocese of San Diego project with HHAP Round 2 County. Mr. Javier Moreno made a motion that the budget revision ratification be accepted as presented, and Ms. Sabrina Barber seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously, 8-0.

- ii. Mr. Les Smith called for a motion to ratify the budget revision to increase homelessness prevention funding in the Catholic Charities, Diocese of San Diego project with HHAP Round 2 Continuum of Care. Mr. Javier Moreno made a motion that the budget revision ratification be accepted as presented, and Ms. Leticia Plancarte seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously, 8-0.

2. Homeless Housing, Assistance and Prevention Program (HHAP) Round 5 (Attachment 4)

Mr. Garcia clarified that this item is not tied to any specific contracts, as no service provider agreements have been carried out yet. HHAP Round 5 represents a full-year budget revision for the fifth round of the HHAP grant, which was originally awarded \$3.2 million. Eligible activities under this round include the Delivery of Permanent Housing and Innovative Solutions, Prevention and Shelter Diversion, Operating Subsidies, and Street Outreach. He noted that funds initially designated for services coordination have been reallocated to Rapid Rehousing, Delivery of Permanent Housing, and Street Outreach, totaling \$102,000.

Ms. Barber asked whether these reallocated services would still be available through other funding sources. Ms. Vega responded that service coordination plays an essential role in supporting education and employment training, which helps individuals secure and maintain housing.

She added that HHAP Round 3 still provides funding for these services. However, due to changing federal priorities, a decrease in permanent housing funding could be expected. As a result, a budget revision may be submitted to HCD to seek additional funding for these needs.

- i. Mr. Les Smith called for a motion to approve the budget revision to the Homeless Housing, Assistance and Prevention Program Round 5 to increase Rapid Rehousing funding from \$220,281.11 to \$314,026.40. Mr. Javier Moreno made a motion for the budget revision be approved as presented, and Mr. Kirk Mann seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously, 8-0.
- ii. Mr. Les Smith called for a motion to approve the budget revision to the Homeless Housing, Assistance and Prevention Program Round 5 to increase Delivery of Permanent Housing funding from \$2,202,811.07 to \$2,284,682.21. Ms. Sabrina Barber made the motion for the budget revision be approved as presented, and Ms. Cierra Gibbs seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously, 8-0.
- iii. Mr. Les Smith called for a motion to approve the budget revision to the Homeless Housing, Assistance and Prevention Program Round 5 to reduce Street Outreach funding from \$146,854.07 to \$44,664.67. Ms. Leticia Plancarte made the motion for the budget revision be approved as presented, and Ms. Cierra Gibbs seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously, 8-0.
- iv. Mr. Les Smith called for a motion to approve the budget revision to the Homeless

Housing, Assistance and Prevention Program Round 5 to reduce Services Coordination funding from \$73,427.03 to \$0.00. Ms. Ramona Campos made the motion for the budget revision be approved as presented, and Mr. Kirk Mann seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously, 8-0.

3. Discussion/ action regarding the Imperial Valley Continuum of Care Executive Board Leadership (Attachment 5)

The Executive Board engaged in an in-depth discussion regarding the current composition of the Board. It was noted that several board seats remained vacant, impacting on the operational effectiveness of the Council. The Board identified which specific seats were vacant and discussed the roles and responsibilities associated with each vacancy. Members expressed concerns about the impact of these vacancies on ongoing projects and committee work. The Board also reviewed the procedures outlined in the charter for filling vacant positions. The Board discussed several possible dates for the Special Meeting, taking into account member availability and the need for a timely resolution of the vacancies. The Chairperson requested that all members provide their availability for the proposed dates. The Special Meeting will focus on the appointment of new board members to fill the vacancies and address any outstanding governance matters.

To maintain continuity and ensure the Council's ability to conduct official business, the Board considered a motion to temporarily extend the terms of the three members whose seats were to expire. Mr. Javier Moreno made the motion to approve a one-month extension of the expired terms, and Mr. Kirk Mann provided the second. Board members discussed the legal and procedural implications of this extension, referencing the Council's charter. Following this discussion, the motion was put to a vote and passed unanimously, with all eight members voting in favor.

In addition, the following took place:

- a. A discussion/ action regarding the Imperial Valley Continuum of Care Executive Board Vice Chair nomination and appointment
- b. Mr. Les Smith called for a motion to nominate one Executive Board Member be appointed to the role of Vice Chair. Mr. Javier Moreno nominated himself to fulfill the role of the Imperial Valley Continuum of Care Council Executive Board Vice Chair, and Ms. Sabrina Barber seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously with no other nominations, 8-0.
- c. Discussion/ action regarding the Imperial Valley Continuum of Care Executive Board Secretary nomination and appointment
- d. Mr. Les Smith made a motion to nominate one Executive Board Member be appointed to the role of Secretary. Ms. Sabrina Barber nominated herself to fulfill the role of the Imperial Valley Continuum of Care Council Executive Board Secretary, and Mr. Javier Moreno seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously with no other

nominations, 8-0.

4. Administrative Entity Updates (Attachment 6)

a. Annual General Membership Meeting Highlights

Mr. Hester provided a brief update on the Annual Membership Meeting held on December 11, 2025. He presented a slide from the meeting and noted that the update is being provided for record.

b. Homeless Housing, Assistance and Prevention Program (HHAP) Round 3 Update

Ms. Vega provided an update on the Riverwalk Affordable Housing Project, highlighting recent progress. She reviewed slides showcasing the building's exterior, the features of both accessible and non-accessible units, and the bathroom equipped with a bathtub. Overall, she reported that the project continues to move forward.

c. Homeless Housing, Assistance and Prevention Program (HHAP) Round 5 Requests for Proposals (RFP) Update

Mr. Hester provided an overview of the Homeless Housing Assistance Prevention Program Round 5 timeline. He noted that the Request for Proposals (RFP) was released on January 8, 2026. All expenditures must be made by the June 30, 2028 deadline, with scoring and ranking of proposals scheduled for February 24, 2026.

d. 2026 Point-in-Time Count Updates

Mr. Hester shared updates on the upcoming Point-in-Time count. The Inner-City count will take place on January 23, 2026, followed by the Slab City count on January 24, 2026. In preparation, donations and volunteer recruitment efforts are ongoing, and care kits will be assembled on January 14, 2026. There are currently 72 registered volunteers, who will receive Starbucks gift cards for their participation.

e. CoC NOFO Local Competition

The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) released the FY 2025 Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) on November 13, 2025. However, HUD withdrew the FY 2025 Continuum of Care (CoC) NOFO as of December 8, 2025. The previous NOFO covered FY 2024–2025. Staff are currently awaiting additional guidance from HUD and will continue to monitor the CoC Competition website and related notifications for updates.

f. Homeless Resource Assistance Line – December 2025

The Administrative Entity reported 209 calls to the Homeless Resource Assistance Line in December 2025, averaging 9 to 10 calls per day. Since inception, 2,780 calls have been logged, with El Centro generating the most inquiries.

VIII. Board Member Announcements

Ms. Renee Robles announced that Ms. Arballo will serve as the lead analyst for the Point-in-Time (PIT) Count. This year marks a new initiative: instead of relying solely on donations as in

previous years, a substantial quantity of care kit items was purchased following an approved supply request. As a result, care kits will be fully stocked and available not only for the PIT Count but also for ongoing distribution throughout the year.

Mr. Les Smith, Executive Board Chair, called the meeting to order at 1:33 PM.

II. Roll Call

Ms. Renee A. Robles conducted roll call, confirming the presence of Chair Les Smith, Mr. Javier Moreno, Ms. Leticia Plancarte, Ms. Cierra Gibbs, Mr. Kirk Mann, Mr. Richard F. Lopez, and herself. A quorum was confirmed, allowing the meeting to proceed. Staff and community stakeholders also attended.

III. Approval of the agenda

Mr. Les Smith requested a motion to approve the agenda. The motion passed unanimously, 6-0.

IV. Public Comment

Department of Social Services Deputy Director Ms. Renee A. Robles stated that no public comment was received.

V. Discussion/Action Items

1. Discussion/action regarding the Imperial Valley Continuum of Care Council Executive Board Chair nomination and appointment (Attachment 1)

Ms. Paula Llanas, Director of the Imperial County Department of Social Services, presented a PowerPoint and led a discussion/action item regarding the Imperial Valley Continuum of Care Council Executive Board Chair, Section 6.14 of the Board Charter Leadership. Responsibilities of the Chair were reviewed, including presiding over the first meeting of the year to designate the Board Chair, facilitating orderly discussion and Board business, and the Chair's ability to vote on action items, which are typically framed by the Chair but not exercised.

The Executive Board Chair provides leadership and oversight to ensure compliance with the CoC Charter. Responsibilities include facilitating monthly meetings, coordinating with the Administrative Entity, and leading agenda development. The Chair sets meeting priorities, places items on the agenda, and remains available to address time-sensitive matters, including grant-related items requiring immediate direction to the Administrative Entity. The Chair also ensures leadership and coordination of efforts to address homelessness.

Ms. Llanas stated her intent to submit an item for further discussion regarding the nomination of the Executive Board Chair. Mr. Javier Moreno made a motion to nominate Mr. Les Smith as Chair. The motion was seconded by Mr. Richard Lopez. Mr. Les Smith accepted the nomination. The motion carried unanimously, 6-0.

2. Accept the resignation of Imperial Valley Continuum of Care Council Executive Board Member Rosa Diaz (Attachment 2)

Ms. Llanas presented that Ms. Rosa Diaz, who represented the Community on the Executive Board while employed with the LGBT Center, submitted her resignation. Official resignation was received on January 2, 2026. This item was placed on the agenda for acknowledgment and action. Ms. Llanas requested acceptance of Ms. Diaz' resignation from the Executive Board. Mr. Kirk Mann made a motion to accept the resignation of Ms. Diaz. The motion was seconded by Ms. Leticia Plancarte. All those in favor voted unanimously, and the motion passed.

3. Approve and appoint the recommendations regarding the Imperial Valley Continuum of Care Council Executive Board vacant seats as follows (Attachment 3)

Ms. Llanas presented an item for approval and appointment of vacant IVCCC Executive Board seats. Ms. Plancarte and Ms. Cierra Gibbs were asked to excuse themselves due to a potential conflict of interest, as they were applicants. The initial Executive Board application release occurred in November 2025; no applications were received. A second application round was released on December 12, 2025. Applications were received for seats

expiring in December 2025, including vacancies. A total of six vacancies were identified, and eleven applications were received. According to the Charter, members must represent special populations and geographic regions, including Public Housing Agencies, Business Leader, Advocate, Government, and Community Representatives.

The Executive Board reported three resignations: Dr. Kathleen Lang, Ms. Sarah Enz, and Ms. Rosa Diaz. Additionally, three terms concluded for Ms. Campos, Ms. Gibbs, and Ms. Plancarte.

The Nominating Committee presented its recommendations after reviewing the applications received. The nominees for the IVCCC Executive Board were as follows: Gabriel Aguirre as the BIPOC Organization representative with a focus on youth, Leticia Plancarte as the Imperial County Behavioral Health Services representative, Joaquin Zambrano as the Nonprofit Homeless Assistance Provider representative, Claudia Camarena as the Government Agency representative, Cassandra Costa as the Government Law Enforcement representative, and John Moreno Jr. as the representative for persons with lived experience.

The Board reviewed and approved the slate nominees for positions on the IVCCC Executive Board. The following individuals will be submitted to the General Membership for ratification: Ms. Cassandra Costa and Mr. John Moreno, Jr., who are nominated to complete unexpired terms ending in December 2026. For the vacant three-year term seats, the nominees are Mr. Gabriel Aguirre (BIPOC, Education, and Youth), Ms. Leticia Plancarte (Mental Health Agency), Mr. Joaquin Zambrano (Non-Profit Homeless Assistance Provider), and Ms. Claudia Camarena (Government Agency).

- a. Motion to approve and appoint Gabriel Aguirre, representative of BIPOC, Education, and Youth, to fill a vacant IVCCC Executive Board seat for a three-year term, contingent upon ratification by the General Membership.

Mr. Javier Moreno made the motion to approve and appoint Gabriel Aguirre as presented. Mr. Richard Lopez seconded the motion. The Board voted and the motion passed unanimously, 6-0.

- b. Motion to approve and appoint Leticia Plancarte as the Mental Health Agency representative to fill a vacant IVCCC Executive Board seat for a three-year term, contingent upon ratification by the General Membership.

Mr. Javier Moreno made the motion to approve and appoint Leticia Plancarte as presented. Mr. Kirk Mann seconded the motion. The Board voted and the motion passed unanimously, 6-0.

- c. Motion to approve and appoint Joaquin Zambrano as the Non-Profit Homeless Assistance Provider to fill a vacant IVCCC Executive Board seat for a three-year term, contingent upon ratification by the General Membership.

Mr. Kirk Mann made the motion to approve and appoint Joaquin Zambrano as presented. Mr. Richard Lopez seconded the motion. The Board voted and the motion passed unanimously, 6-0.

- d. Motion to approve and appoint Claudia Camarena as the Government Agency representative to fill a vacant IVCCC Executive Board seat for a three-year term, contingent upon ratification by the General Membership.

Mr. Richard Lopez made the motion to approve and appoint Claudia Camarena as presented. Mr. Javier Moreno seconded the motion. The Board voted and the motion passed unanimously, 6-0.

- e. Motion to approve and appoint Cassandra Costa as the Government Law Enforcement representative to fill a vacant IVCCC Executive Board seat, completing an unexpired term through December 2026, contingent upon ratification by the General Membership.

Mr. Kirk Mann made the motion to approve and appoint Cassandra Costa as presented. Mr. Richard Lopez seconded the motion. The Board voted and the motion passed unanimously, 6-0.

- f. Motion to approve and appoint John Moreno Jr. as the Lived Experience representative to fill a vacant IVCCC Executive Board seat, completing an unexpired term through December 2026, contingent upon ratification by the General Membership.

Mr. Javier Moreno made the motion to approve and appoint John Moreno Jr. as presented. Mr. Richard Lopez seconded the motion. The Board voted and the motion passed unanimously, 6-0.

VI. Board Member Announcements

Ms. Llanas requested a special General Membership meeting. She stated that the General Membership meeting should occur first, followed by the opportunity for the newly appointed Executive Board to be present. Mr. Smith provided remarks regarding homelessness in Los Angeles County and commended the Imperial County Administrative Entity for its excellent work over the past year, including oversight of CoC volunteer activities. Mr. Smith also noted that Los Angeles County is investing \$23 million in homelessness funding. Ms. Llanas thanked all participants for their work and dedication.

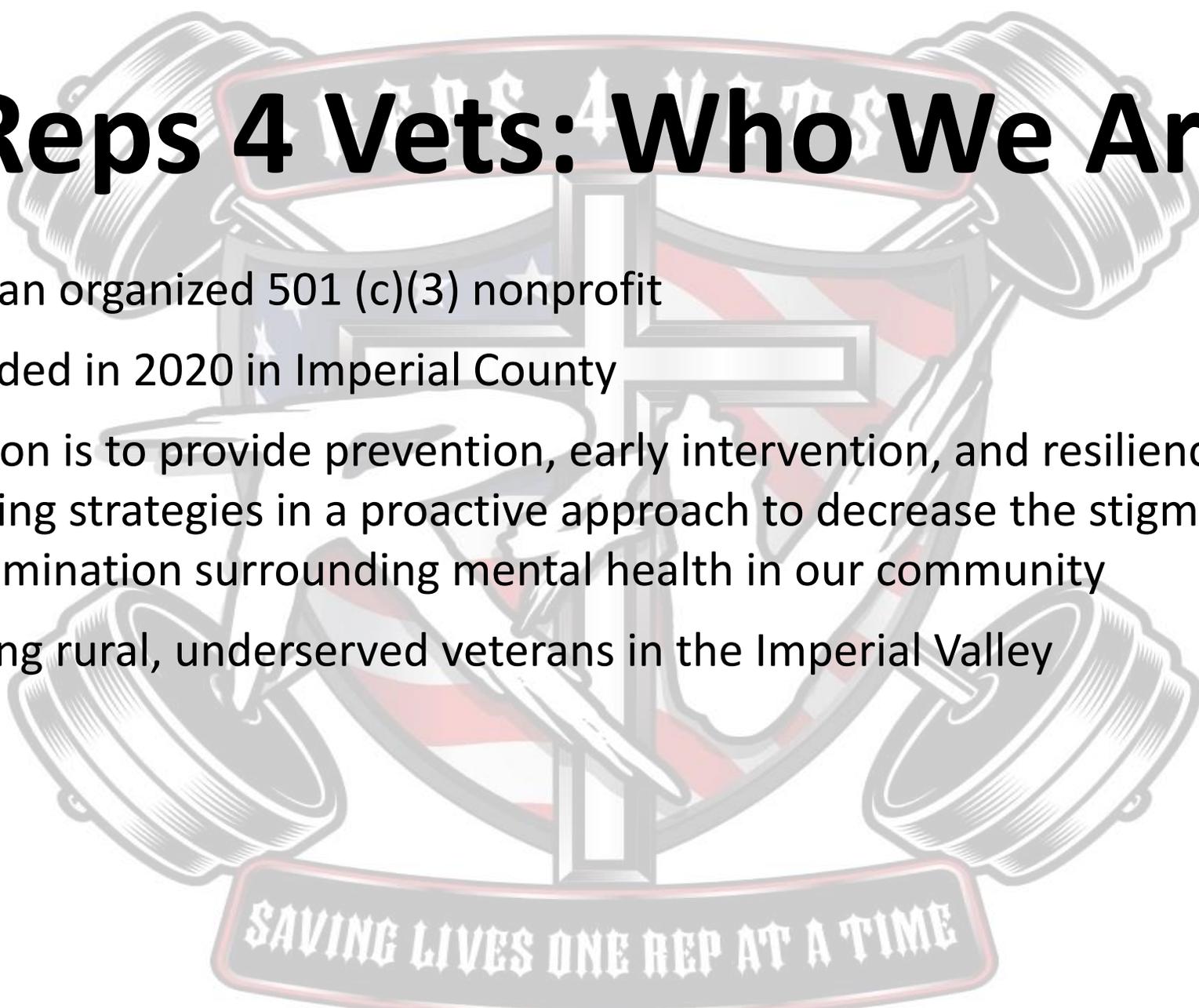

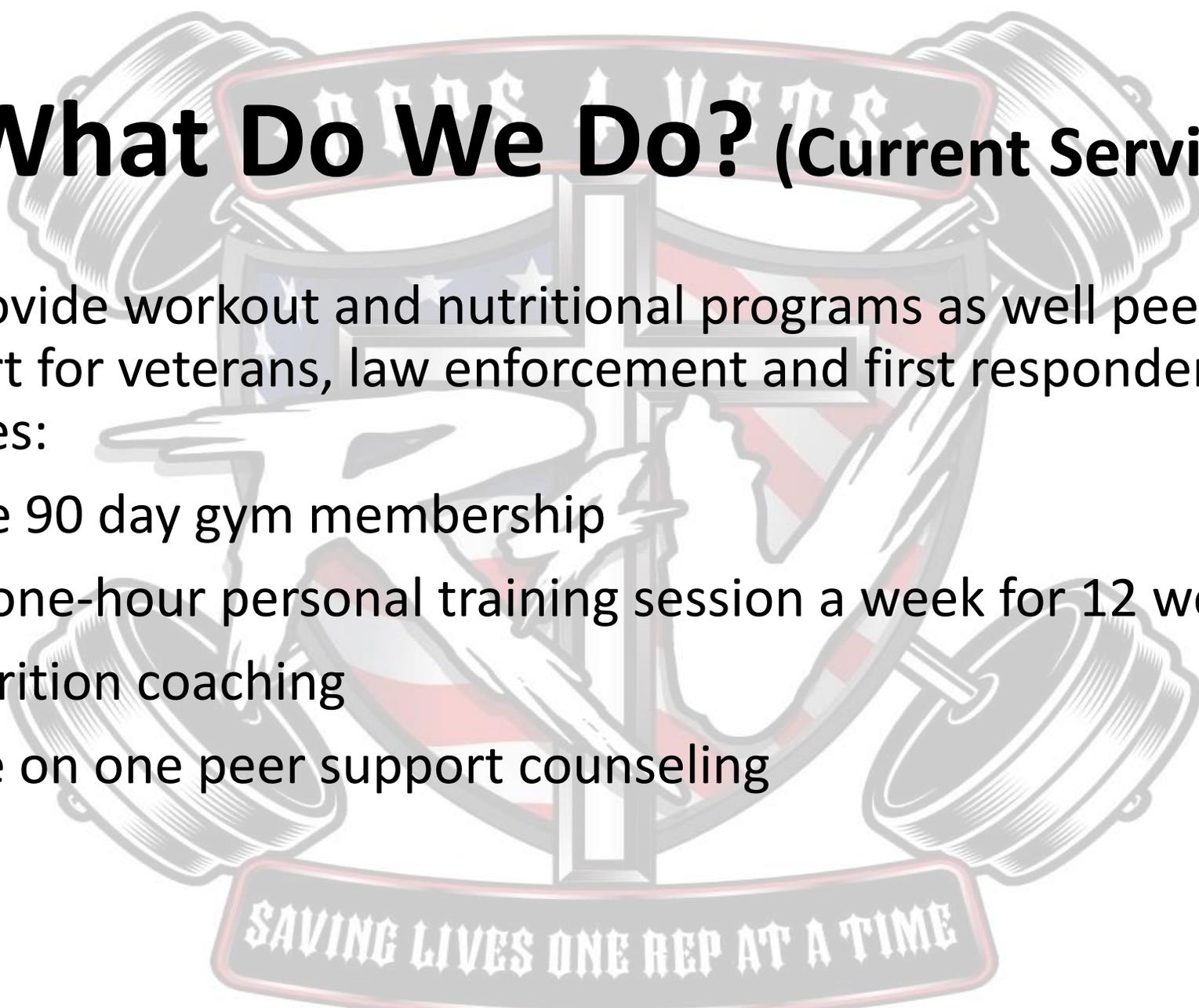

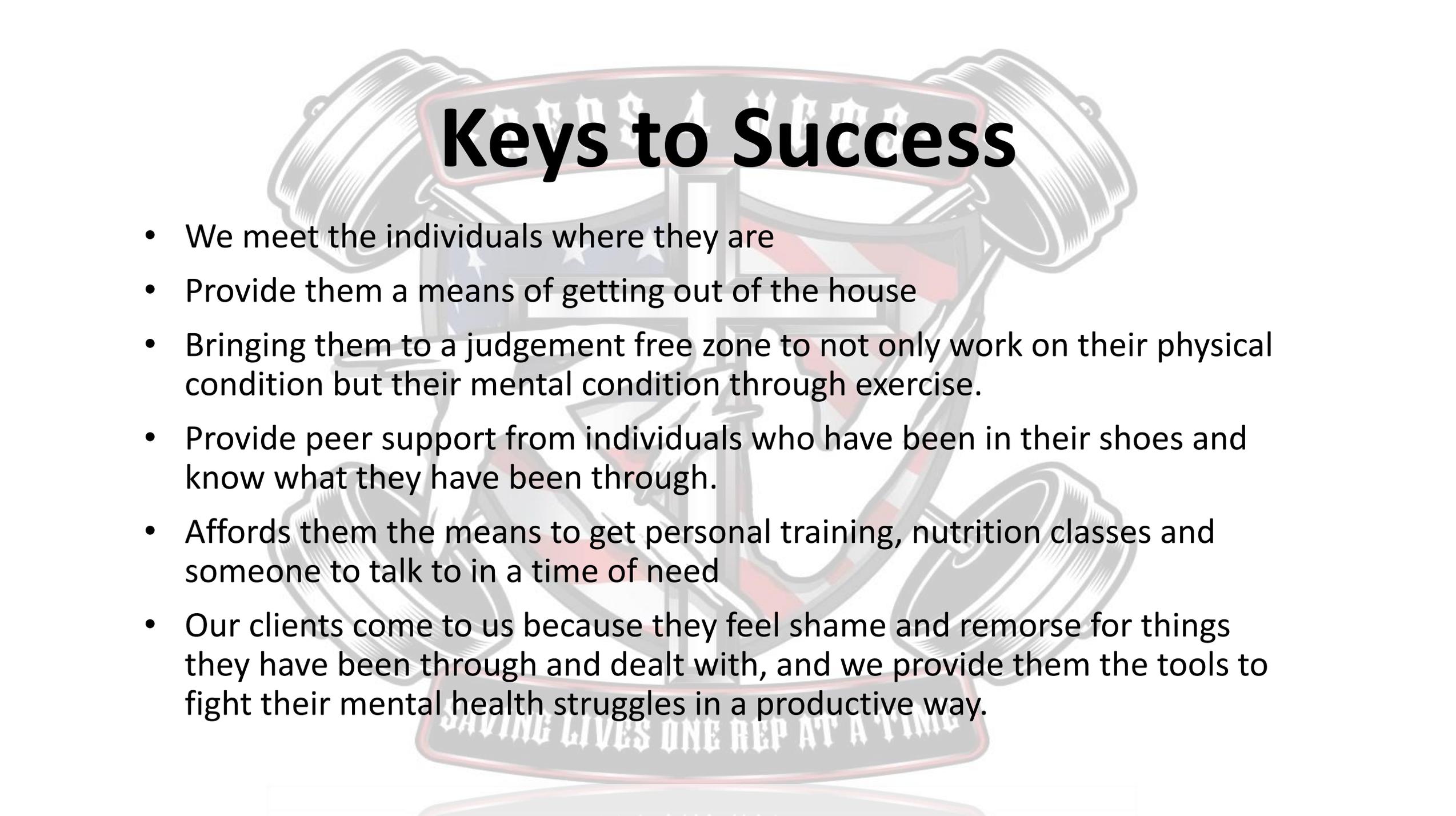
Why It Is Important?

Requested Action:

Approve the reallocation of unspent funds from the Homeless Housing, Assistance and Prevention (HHAP) Round 2 Continuum of Care Grant to WomanHaven for Operating Subsidies – Operating Reserves Project Expansion in accordance with HHAP guidelines in an amount not to exceed \$150,000.00.

Background

On February 20, 2025, the Administrative Entity (AE) received notice from the Imperial County Public Administrator (ICPA) to disencumber their HHAP-2 CoC Grant funds, awarded to ICPA on March 15, 2023. These funds must be reallocated to another subrecipient awarded under HHAP-2 CoC with the intent to utilize the funds before the State determined deadline of June 30, 2026.

The AE recommends reallocating these HHAP-2 CoC funds from the ICPA award in the amount of \$150,000.00 (\$91,402.80 awarded for Rental Assistance and Rapid Rehousing, and \$58,597.20 awarded for Street Outreach) to WomanHaven, Inc. based on their ranking in the original Request for Proposal process. This reallocation will allow WomanHaven, Inc. to expand their project of Operating Subsidies – Operating Reserves. Funds will be utilized as Operating Reserves to maintain and operate shelters as well as expenses across the WomanHaven HHAP-2 Project. In addition, with the support of Operating Reserves, funding will be utilized to maintain homeless services and housing delivery systems to serve persons experiencing homelessness, including homeless youth.

This reallocation, not to exceed \$150,000.00, will ensure the continuity and enhancement of critical services provided to our community's most vulnerable populations.

Background

Originally announced by the Homeless Coordinating and Financing Council (HCFC), HHAP 2 had an availability of \$300 million. This second round of HHAP funding was authorized by AB 83 (Committee on Budget, Chapter 15, Statutes of 2020) which was signed into law by Governor Gavin Newsom on June 29, 2020. Eligible applicants for this funding included California's 13 largest cities, 58 counties, and 44 Continuums of Care.

HHAP 2 was designed to build on regional coordination developed through previous rounds of HCFC Homeless Emergency Aid Program (HEAP), HHAP, and COVID-19 funding.

Now administered by the California Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD), applicants are encouraged to prioritize the use of HHAP funds to assist people experiencing literal homelessness move into safe, stable housing.

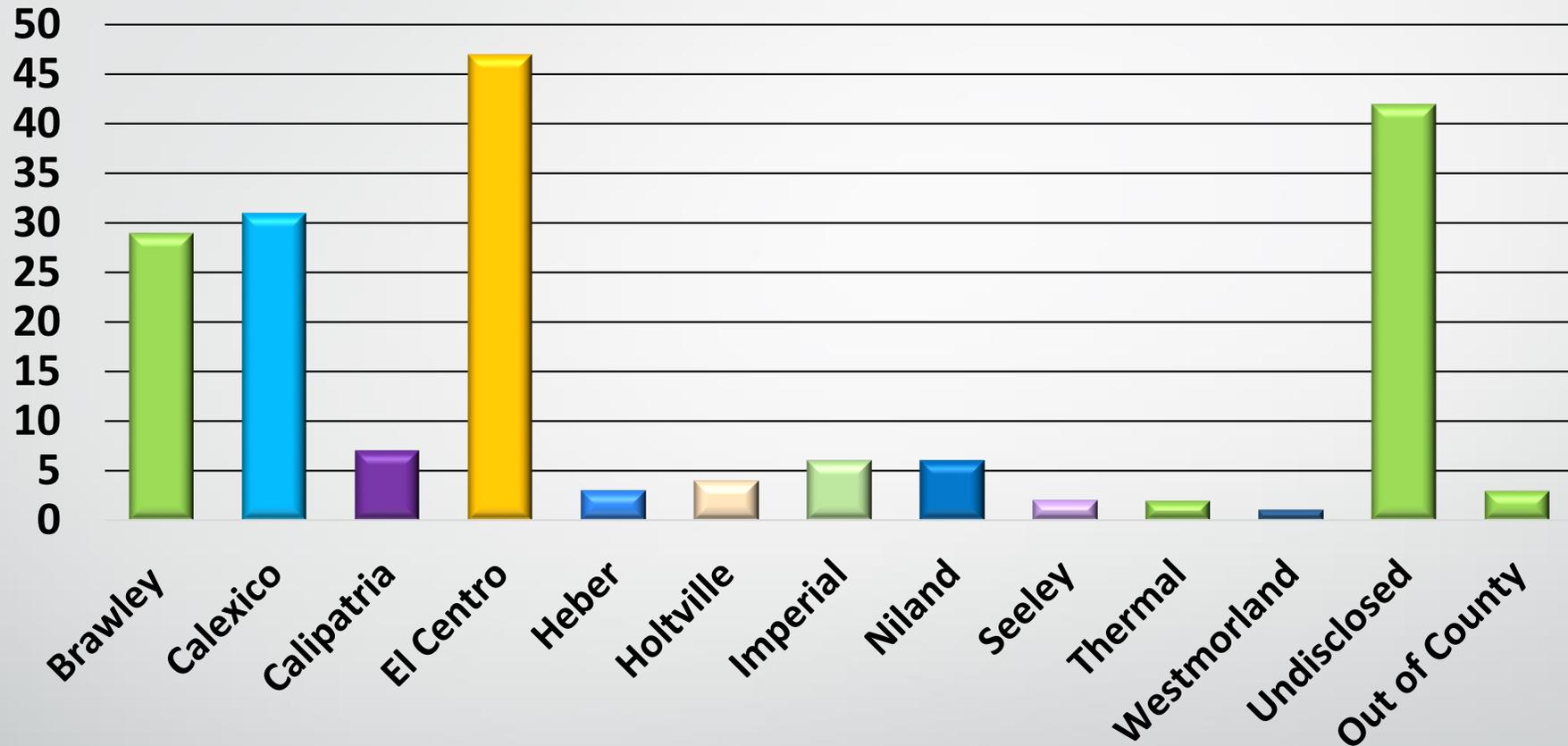

Homeless Resource Assistance Line

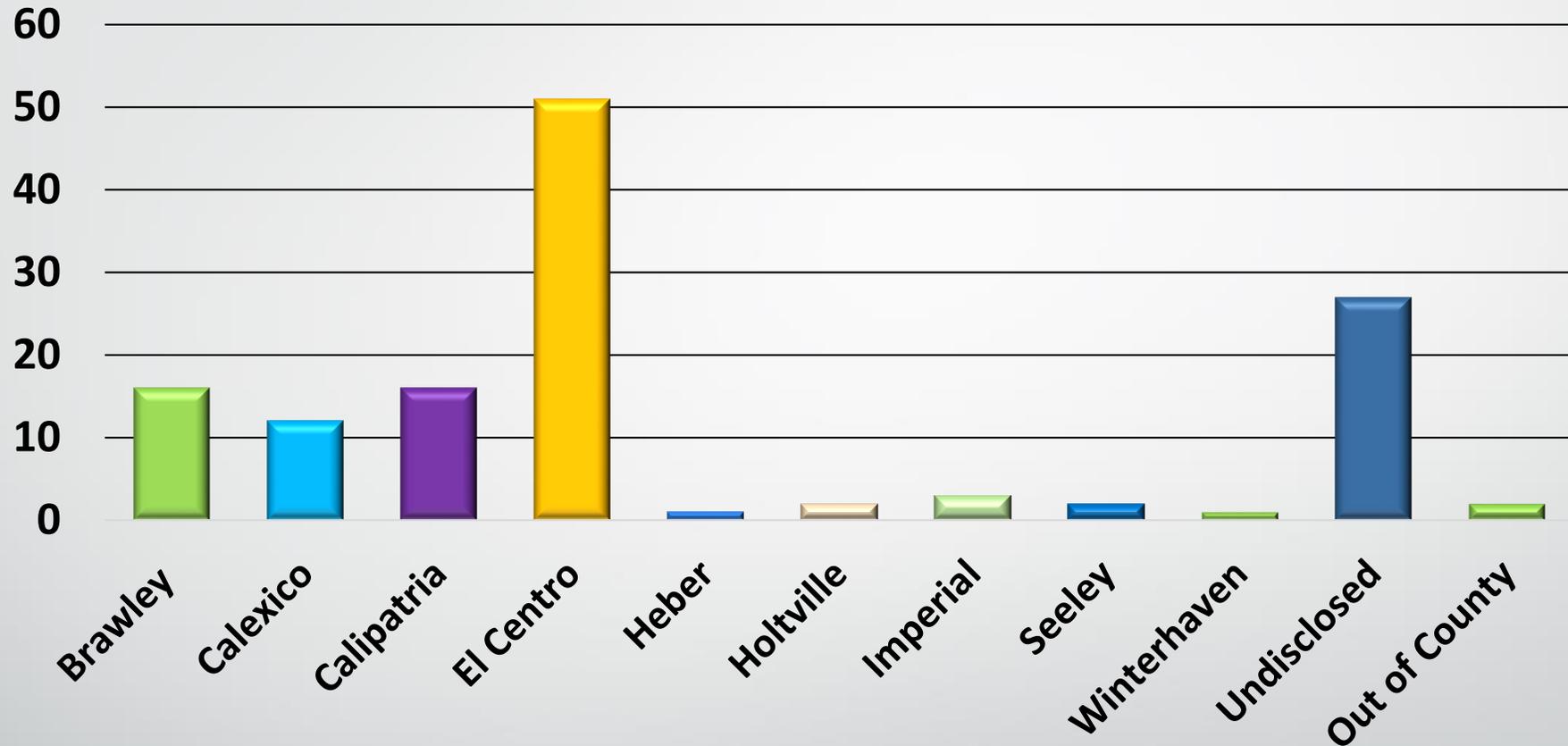
