- I. **Call to Order** Mr. Les Smith, Executive Board Chair, called the meeting to order at 1:00 PM.
- II. **Roll Call** Ms. Sabrina Barber conducted roll call; board members present indicated above along with staff and community stakeholders. A quorum was confirmed. Mr. John Moreno arrived subsequent to the approval of the Agenda and Minutes.
- III. **Approval of Agenda** Chair, Les Smith inquired whether any revisions or additions are to be made to the agenda. The Administrative Entity requested a revision to Discussion/ Action Item 1., Section a.iii., to revise the award amount to \$2,284,682.21. Ms. Sabrina Barber motioned to approve the revision and Vice Chair Mr. Javier Moreno seconded the motion, Mr. Kirk Mann Abstained. The motion passed unanimously, 7-0, and one abstention.

Chair Les Smith called for a motion to approve the agenda for April 1, 2026, meeting. Mr. Javier Moreno motioned to approve, and Mr. Gabriel Aguirre seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously, 8-0.
- IV. **Approval of Minutes** Chair, Les Smith called for a motion to approve the minutes of March 4, 2026, meeting. Mr. Kirk Mann motioned to approve, and Mr. Javier Moreno seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously, 8-0.
- V. **Public Comment** No public comment was received.
- VI. **Special Presentations**

1. **Imperial County Public Health – Imperial County Community Health Improvement Partnership (ICCHIP)**

Mr. Jorge Torres, Manager at Imperial County Public Health, delivered a PowerPoint presentation on the Imperial County Community Health Improvement Partnership (ICCHIP). ICCHIP is a collaborative partnership comprised of stakeholders from various community organizations and county departments focused on housing and public health. The partnership was established following a countywide community health assessment to identify key needs and priorities. Areas of focus include health food access, physical activity, mental health, and community safety, reflecting the needs and priorities identified by the community.

The Community Health Assessment (CHA) results informed the development of the Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP). Based on these findings, priority area groups were established, each focusing on specific topics. CHIP serves as a structured work plan to guide collective efforts in addressing community identified needs and advancing improvement initiatives.

From the Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP), priority areas were established. Priority area (2) focuses on healthy and safe living. Additionally, two priority areas address access to high quality healthcare, which is divided into two tracks due to it's a big topic: (1) preventive health services and (2) healthcare workforce. Priority Area 3 focuses on access to high quality behavioral health services.

Discussion focused on increasing awareness of housing resources. Under Priority Area 1, efforts include identifying support for resource coordination and emphasizing safe, healthy housing. The group also considered local versus state and federal roles and reviewed the housing status in Imperial County.

2. **The Becoming Project – Green Social Housing Presentation**

Mr. William Cooper, Executive Director of The Becoming Project, provided a presentation on Green Social Housing. Green Social Housing is an initiative focused on creating a long-term, permanently affordable model. It is publicly or community owned, not profit driven, and emphasizes resident control, sustainability, and access to healthy homes near services and transit.

Ms. Sridevi Kalyanasundaram, Family Nurse Practitioner, presented on hospitalizations and ER visits have surpassed 200 annually, with a goal to reduce by 15-20% this year. The Imperial Valley has historically faced high emergency room usage, with local initiatives (such as those under CalAIM) aiming to reduce unnecessary, costly medical care by providing better care management.

The Arostigui Home is the proposed site for the Becoming Project, providing emergencies and rapid rehousing in Imperial County. The property was donated by the Arostigui Family. They designated the site to support long term housing solutions a project focused on providing permanent, sustainable, and affordable housing for the community. The Arostigui Home site will include 16 tiny homes with multiple rooms, each costing approximately \$24,000. Staff and case managers will be on site and available to assist walk ins.

Green Social Housing will provide free housing for individuals experiencing homelessness, without additional requirements or enrollment. The proposed project will prioritize environmental sustainability and avoid fossils fuels development due to regional environmental concerns. Housing will be community owned through The Becoming Project, a 501c3, with all funding reinvested into the community. Residents will pay no more than 30% of their monthly income for housing.

VII. Discussion/Action Items

1. Homeless Housing, Assistance and Prevention Program (HHAP) Round 5 – Request for Proposals (RFP)

Administrative Entity Analyst Eduardo Garcia presented the Homeless Housing, Assistance and Prevention Program (HHAP) Round 5, Request for Proposals, making a total of \$3,267,503.09 available for awarding agencies depending on their project proposals in unison to the Imperial Valley Continuum of Care mission and Action Plan, adhering to Grant Program standards.

Eleven (11) agencies submitted their proposals to be awarded funds from HHAP Round 5. A Scoring & Ranking Committee convened and provided recommendations to award five (5) agencies. The recommended approval of awardees are as follows:

Mr. Javier Moreno, Mr. Kirk Mann, and Mr. Joaquin Zambrano recused from voting on all Board Action Items pertinent to the Homeless Housing, Assistance and Prevention Program Round 5 – Request for Proposals Recommended Awards due to a conflict of interest.

a. Board Action Item

- i. Approve the recommendations of the Scoring and Ranking Committee to award HHAP-5 funding in the amount of \$157,013.20 for Catholic Charities, Diocese of San Diego – Catholic Charities Day Center Rapid Rehousing. Ms. Sabrina Barber

made a motion that the HHAP-5 Funding Award be approved as presented and Mr. Gabriel Aguirre seconded the motion. The motion carried, 7-0.

- ii. Approve the recommendations of the Scoring and Ranking Committee to award HHAP-5 funding in the amount of \$128,497.31 for Catholic Charities, Diocese of San Diego – Catholic Charities Day Center Prevention and Diversion. Mr. Gabriel Aguirre made a motion that the HHAP-5 Funding Award be approved as presented and Ms. Claudia Camarena seconded the motion. The motion carried, 7-0.
- iii. Approve the recommendations of the Scoring and Ranking Committee to award HHAP-5 funding in the amount of \$2,284,682.21 for Imperial Valley Housing Authority – Town & Country Apartments Delivery of Permanent Housing. Ms. Sabrina Barber made a motion that the HHAP-5 Funding Award be approved as presented and Mr. Richard Lopez seconded the motion. The motion carried, 7-0.
- iv. Approve the recommendations of the Scoring and Ranking Committee to award HHAP-5 funding in the amount of \$183,567.59 for Mirka Investments LLC – Hollies Affordable Housing Operating Subsidies. Mr. Gabriel Aguirre made a motion that the HHAP-5 Funding Award be approved as presented and Ms. Sabrina Barber seconded the motion. The motion carried, 7-0.
- v. Approve the recommendations of the Scoring and Ranking Committee to award HHAP-5 funding in the amount of \$157,013.20 for Whole Person Care Clinic – Pathways to Stable Home Health Rapid Rehousing. Ms. Claudia Camarena made a motion that the HHAP-5 Funding Award be approved as presented and Ms. Sabrina Barber seconded the motion. The motion carried, 7-0.
- vi. Approve the recommendations of the Scoring and Ranking Committee to award HHAP-5 funding in the amount of \$128,497.32 for Whole Person Care Clinic – Pathways to Stable Home Health Prevention and Diversion. Mr. Richard Lopez made a motion that the HHAP-5 Funding Award be approved as presented and Mr. Gabriel Aguirre seconded the motion. The motion carried, 7-0.
- vii. Approve the recommendations of the Scoring and Ranking Committee to award HHAP-5 funding in the amount of \$44,664.67 for Whole Person Care Clinic – Pathways to Stable Home and Health Street Outreach. Ms. Sabrina Barber made a motion that the HHAP-5 Funding Award be approved as presented and Mr. Gabriel Aguirre seconded the motion. The motion carried, 7-0.
- viii. Approve the recommendations of the Scoring and Ranking Committee to award HHAP-5 funding in the amount of \$183,567.59 for WomanHaven – Safe Home Operating Subsidies. Ms. Claudia Camarena made a motion that the HHAP-5 Funding Award be approved as presented and Mr. Gabriel Aguirre seconded the motion. The motion carried, 7-0.

2. Administrative Entity Updates

Ms. Eleanor Vega, Administrative Entity representative, presented Administrative Entity updates

- a. Homeless Housing, Assistance and Prevention (HHAP) Grant Program Round 3 update.

An update on the Homeless Housing Assistance and Prevention (HHAP) Round 3 Riverwalk Project was provided. Riverwalk construction is complete and youth set aside units are in progress.

b. Homeless Housing, Assistance and Prevention (HHAP) Grant Program Round 6 Award Overview

On March 2, 2026, Governor Newsom announced 20 awards made through Housing and Community Development (HCD) for the Homeless Housing, Assistance and Prevention (HHAP) Grant Program Round 6, awarding the Imperial Region 100% of their allocated funding.

Imperial County and the Imperial County Continuum of Care Council applied for this award as joint applicants, successfully being awarded \$3,558,569.42 to support rapid rehousing programs, rental subsidies, prevention and diversion efforts, motel/hotel vouchers, and existing permanent housing services and coordination.

c. HUD System Performance Measures (Sys PM)

System Performance Measures (SPM) enable the community to track progress in addressing the needs of individuals experiencing homelessness and to report outcomes to Housing and Urban Developments. The System Performance Measures (SPM) report submission is a factor considered in the annual Continuum of Care (CoC) competition. The final SPM submission deadline was March 4, 2026, at 8:00 PM.

The IVCCC SPMs were submitted timely on February 20, 2026.

d. Longitudinal System Analysis (LSA) Report

The Continuum of Care (CoC) is required to submit the Longitudinal Systems Analysis (LSA) report annually through HMIS. The data supports the Annual Homeless Assessment Report (AHAR) submitted to Congress by HUD.

Imperial County met the benchmark of successfully uploading the LSA Report by the deadline of December 1, 2025.

The final upload was completed on January 16, 2026, successfully meeting the deadline for the LSA Report.

e. Homeless Resource Assistance Line - March 2026

The Homeless Resource Assistance Line received a total of 160 calls during the month of March 2026. The total of calls year-to-date are 623. These calls are categorized by city, with El Centro generating the most inquiries. HHAP funded agencies are WomanHaven, Catholic Charities and Encompass Housing. Among these agencies, WomanHaven received 60 referrals, Catholic Charities Day Center received 30 referrals, and Encompass Housing received 40 referrals.

VIII. Board Member Announcements

A board Member suggested reinstating standing committees to support ideas and recommendations. Ms. Renee Robles informed that Ms. Andrea M. Arballo is leading this effort and will provide updates.

IX. Meeting Adjournment

The meeting was adjourned at 2:39 PM. The next Executive Board meeting is scheduled for May 6, 2026, from 1:00 PM to 3:00 PM.

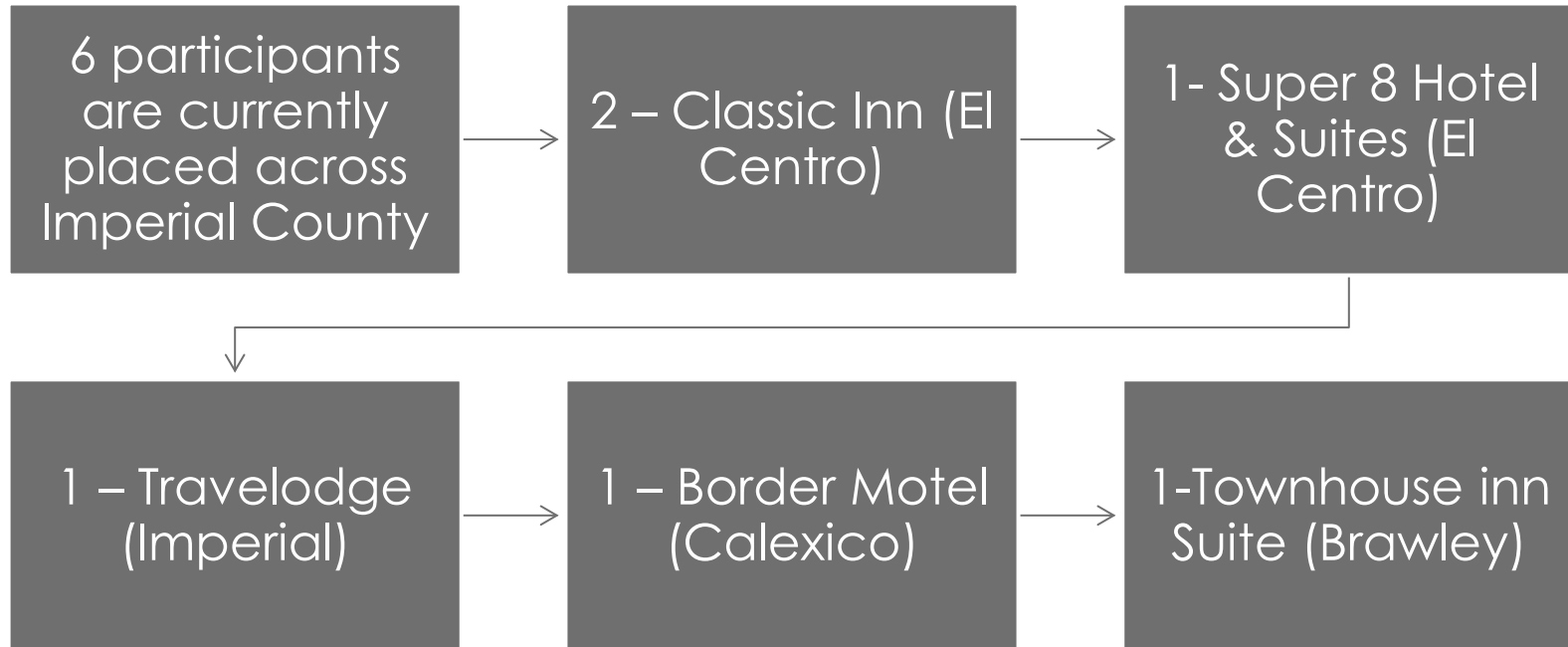

Housing First Commitment & Looking Ahead

Housing First Principles

- No preconditions — housing provided without sobriety or program requirements
- Encompass removes barriers: poor credit, rental/criminal history, perceived lack of readiness
- WPCC meets individuals where they are — streets, parks, bus stations
- Whole-person care: medical + behavioral health + housing support integrated
- **Direct result: 13-day average placement time for families with children**

Ongoing & Planned Initiatives

- Continue expanded 5x/week street outreach schedule

Background

On June 17, 2025, the Imperial County Board of Supervisors approved the Homeless Housing, Assistance and Prevention (HHAP) Grant Program Round 5 funding to include the following Eligible Activities: Rapid Rehousing, Prevention and Diversion, Delivery of Permanent Housing, Operating Subsidies, and Street Outreach.

On April 1, 2026, the IVCCC Executive Board approved awards to the following providers based on recommendations from the HHAP Round 5 Scoring and Ranking committee: Catholic Charities Diocese of San Diego, Imperial Valley Housing Authority (IVHA), Mirka Investments LLC, WomanHaven and Whole Person Care Clinic. Contracts between the County of Imperial and these five providers are currently in progress.

Provider Street Outreach

Coverage Period: January 1, 2026 – April 15, 2026

- **Lead Outreach Agencies:** Whole Person Care Clinic, Catholic Charities, and WomanHaven
- **Encampments Reports:** Information received by various sources including community members, businesses, and Caltrans.
- **Total Encounters:** 319 (may include duplicated individuals)

Concentration Areas (Encampment Size)

- **Calexico Donut Avenue and Business Stop Area:** 13 Individuals
- **Brawley Feed the Need Area:** 8 individuals
- **Northstar Truck Stop, Panda Express and In-N-Out Area:** 8 individuals



Provider Street Outreach (cont.)

Primary Needs

- Mental health/behavioral health services, substance use disorders intervention, and stabilization resources.

Challenges

- Encampments inaccessibility, refusal of services, distrust of system, preference to current living situation/ independence, mental health barriers, and street outreach team safety concerns.

Outcomes

Street Outreach teams provided services to those encountered such as:

- Water, flyers, and referrals
- Referral coordination
- Placement into Recuperative Care



2026 Point-in-Time Count Updates

- The 2026 Point-in-Time (PIT) Count and Housing Inventory Count (HIC) reports have been successfully submitted through the HDX 2.0 portal by the deadline of April 30, 2026.
- The first PIT Committee Meeting for the 2027 Point-in-Time Count will be held on June 4, 2026, via Microsoft Teams.



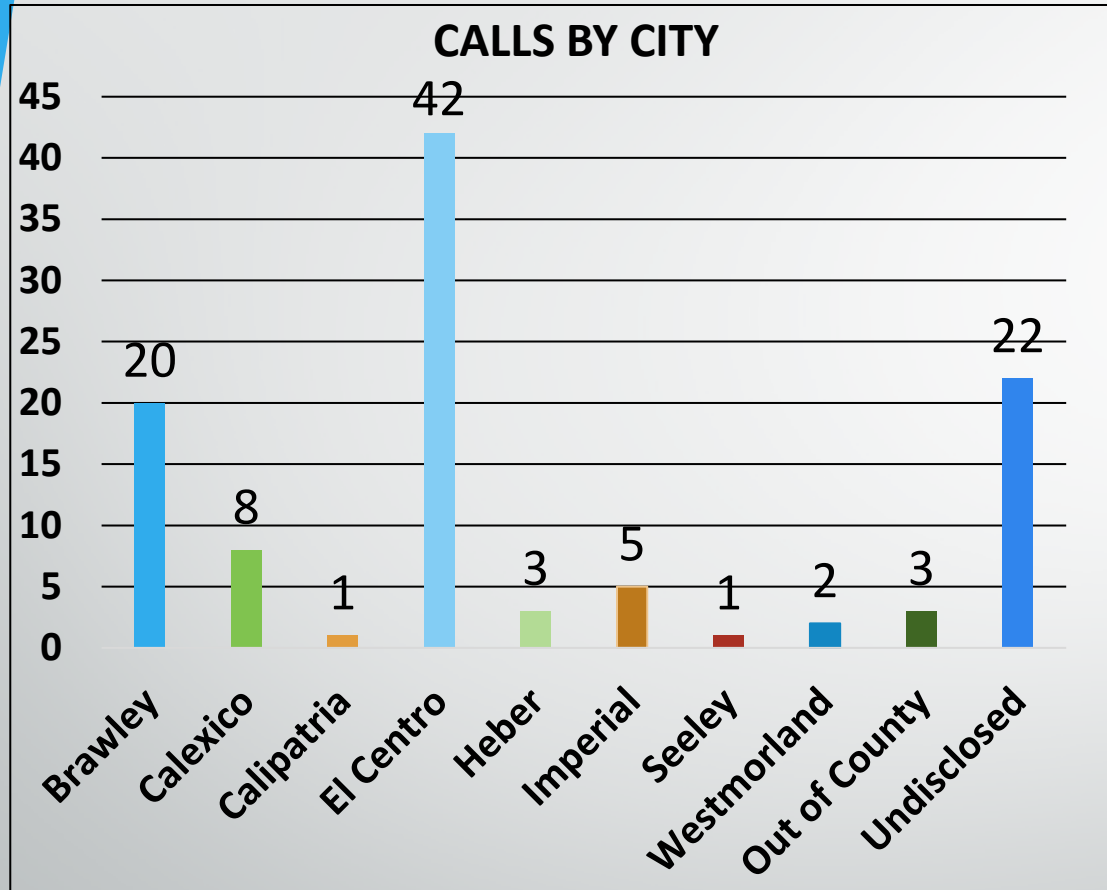
FY 2026 Continuum of Care Notice of Funding Opportunity (CoC NOFO)

- The CoC NOFO Local Competition will be posted on the IVCCC website once available.

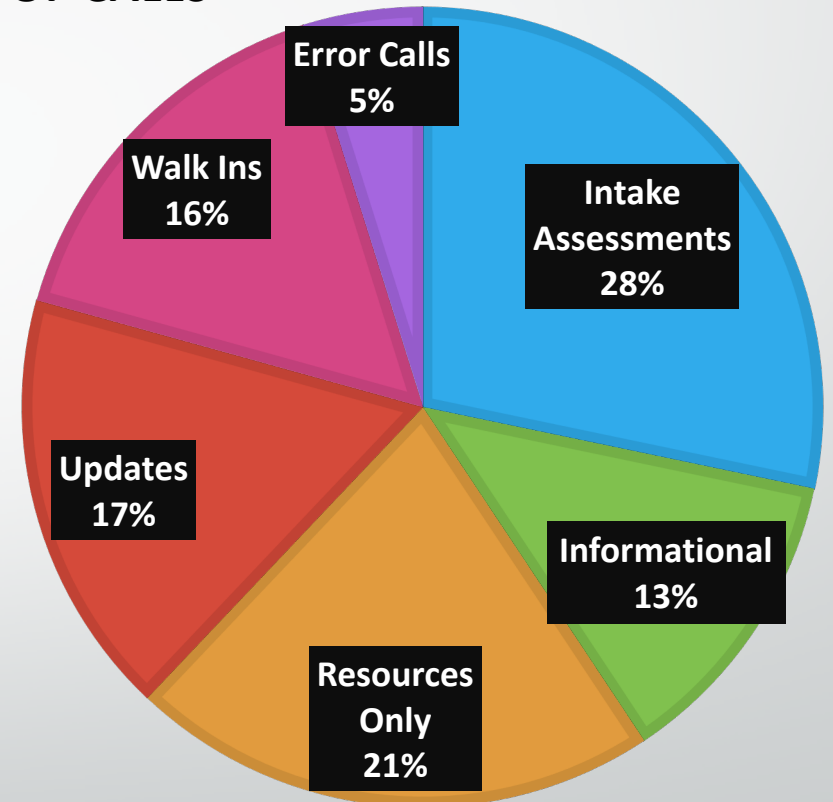
